Rev. Dr. H. Ward Greer to Lead Board of the Afro-American Historical Society



We are pleased to announce that Rev. Dr. H. Ward Greer has been appointed Chairman Pro Tem of the Board of the Afro-American Historical Society of Delaware.

Rev. Greer was born and reared in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He was graduated from Minnehaha Academy. He received a B.S. Degree in Sociology from Westmar College in 1973. He received a Master of Divinity from Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary and was awarded a Doctor of Ministry Degree from United Theological Seminary, specializing in Urban Church Development. Rev. Greer has served as Pastor of Brandywine Trinity and Buttonwood United Methodist Churches. Other local pastorates were Coleman Memorial, Mt. Joy and Ezion-Mt. Carmel United Methodist Churches. Rev. Greer has recently been called to Pastor at Breezewood United Methodist Church and Everett United Methodist Church, both located in nearby Pennsylvania.

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THE BLACK CHURCH FREEDOM'S INCUBATOR AND COMMUNITY ANCHOR



Almost from its inception, the Black Church was the center of the Black community. Not only did it provide for our spiritual well-being, it was freedom's incubator. During slavery the Black Church was a primary station on the Underground Railroad, as well as a prime supporter of the abolition movement. (All this, of course, was done in secrecy and few Black ministers would speak against slavery on the pulpit for fear of seeing their church burned to the ground. Even in the North).

The Black Church is where the African in captivity was first educated. It was the only place we had a chance to socialize and establish relationships. It is where we established our family structure and extensions.

Dr. Greer's community service in Delaware has included: serving on the Board of the Metropolitan Wilmington Urban League, Chairman of the Methodist Action Program Board of Directors, and as President of the Interdenominational Ministerial Acton Council, popularly known as IMAC. Rev. Greer will be working closely with the Historical Society's Founder and CEO, Dr. Harmon R. Carey, to expand the role of the organization to include nontraditional historical activities in keeping with the needs of the community, such as operating the first Black owned/operated Radio Station in Delaware, WHGE- 95.3 FM.

From Emancipation through the Black migrations north, the Black Church was often the first stop for the newly free, for we hoped and expected our church family to take care of us. There was a time all someone new in town needed to do was to find the Black Church and they were straight. You would be fed, found a place to stay and even employment. If you stuck around long enough and became a member of the church, eventually you'd find yourself with a spouse and children.

It is the Black Church from which the Civil Rights Movement sprang. Three such churches were founded on Wilmington's East Side.

Mother A.U.F.C.M.P., Ezion United Methodist , and Bethel A.M.E.

Our greatest victories in the Civil Rights era were planned, organized, and implemented in churches around the nation. The Black Church also produced some of our most notable leaders. From Peter Spencer, Richard Allen and Absalom Jones to Adam Clayton Powell, Jr. and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., the Black Church has been at the forefront of our struggle for freedom and our survival as a people and community.
